The following was found on the Harvard Medical School web site's memorial to Dr. Robert Dorwart:

1"Robert Dorwart cannot be fully remembered without identifying what may be his proudest accomplishment. He was a premier baseball pitcher for Harvard College. Good enough to be recruited by professional teams, he chose instead to pursue medical education. However, he never lost his love for baseball and his cherished moments as a college player. He would just as easily cite baseball statistics as the economic arguments for mental health care coverage. In his home his most cherished mementos were not his diplomas or awards, but pictures and other memorabilia from his baseball years. What he learned from baseball guided every aspect of his life. When the expression "Baseball is life" became popular, Robert (aka "Bob" to many) used to say "I always knew that."

1965 - One Magical Season

"Fern Creek, which has never played in a state tournament of any kind...."1

These words by Courier-Journal writer Bob White accurately described the Fern Creek varsity baseball team (Creekers) in late spring of 1965. While many gifted athletes had preceded them, they were the first to play in a state tournament.

As significant as this accomplishment was, it almost didn't get off the ground. The Creekers were playing the first game of the District Tournament and found themselves down 4-1 going into the top of the last inning against Thomas Jefferson. It was at this point that the **magic** began to happen. The Creekers came up with 7 runs in that inning and won 8-4. The key hit was a Randall Lewis two run scoring double. Without this key inning the season would have ended like many before.

Magic was in the arms of Bob Dorwart and Tony Murphy. They combined to pitch the next three regional games without allowing a run. One of those games was a no-hitter pitched by Dorwart against Flaget.

Magic was also in the execution of the team's most routine play the "squeeze bunt." Locked in a scoreless extra inning game against regional foe Manual, Bill Devine dropped "a perfect bunt along the third base line" to score pinch runner Fred Plahuta to win the game and advance to the Regional finals.

The **magic** continued in the first game of the State Tournament as Bob Dorwart pitched another no-hitter – the first in six previous years of the tournament and only the sixth since the tournament started in 1940 – against Hancock County.

In 1965, the State tournament was a two-day affair with eight teams. The preliminary games were on Thursday and the semi-final and final games on Friday. The Creekers continued their **magical** run with a hard fought semi-final 4-3 win over Ft. Thomas Highlands. Bob Dorwart relieved in this game and pitched an additional three scoreless innings bringing his tournament total to 29 consecutive scoreless innings.

With about twenty minutes of rest, Bob Dorwart took the mound in the finals against Bowling Green. Their pitcher, Stan Markham, had pitched every inning of their first two games and the Creeker hitters were hopeful they would be facing a tired pitcher. If Markham was tired, it didn't show as he and Dorwart dueled for four scoreless innings. Finally, the **magic** seemed to disappear. With two outs and the bases loaded, a Bowling Green player hit a "grounder between first and second base. Fern Creek second baseman Paul Newton stopped the ball on the edge of the outfield grass…" but the Creekers were unable to get the runner at first base. The only 2 runs of the game scored on that play for Bowling Green. Stan Markham put his name in the record books by allowing no Creeker hits.

It was a bitter loss for the Creekers who were used to pulling the games out at the end. However, as the days went by the title of "State Runner-Up" began to take on increased significance as they realized they had traveled where none had gone before. It had been **one magical season.**

Dorwart drove in the only run of the day in the second inning and then blanked the Redskins on two hits, both coming with one out in the final inning. The senior hurler had a perfect game going until then."

²"Bob Dorwart of Fern Creek and Walter Harrison of Male High, two of Jefferson County's better prep baseball pitchers, showed they could hit as well yesterday.

Dorwart, who pitched 6 1/3 perfect innings, drove in the only run with a single as Fern Creek stopped previously unbeaten Seneca 1-0.

The 6-foot-3 senior right hander struck out 13. He yielded successive hits with one out in the seventh. Dorwart's totals for 17 innings this spring read two victories, 30 strike outs and five walks. He has allowed eight runs, four of them unearned."

The slender 6-foot, 160-pound junior right-hander tossed a no-hit, no-run game yesterday as Fern Creek whipped Durrett 6-0.

It was the fourth shut-out by a Tiger hurler this season and improved Fern Creek's record to 5-1. In six games Fern Creek's three best pitchers have a combined earned run average of 0.33.

Murphy, who struck out five in making his record 2-0, also started Fern Creek's six run rally in the seventh inning. He singled and scored the first run."

3"TONY MURPHY HURLS COUNTY'S FIRST NO-HITTER - Tony Murphy of Fern Creek hurled the county's first no-hit game of the season last week as the Tigers downed Durrett 6-0. Murphy recorded five strikeouts in registering his second win of the season without a loss. The junior right-hander also broke a scoreless deadlock in the final inning when he singled and scored the first run in the Tigers' six run rally."



Fern Creek stopped Southern 4-2 yesterday for the Southern District championship and joined four other teams in the regional which is set for May 27-29.

District champions already crowned are Manual, Pleasure Ridge Park, Fern Creek and Waggener, the defending regional titlist.

For the second year in a row, Fern Creek stopped Southern in the district finals. And for the second straight year, pitcher Bob Dorwart had a hand in repulsing the host team.

Dorwart relieved starter Tony Murphy in the fourth inning yesterday and preserved Fern Creek's 4-2 margin. In the final inning Dorwart struck out the side after Southern had threatened with men on second and third. Murphy gave Fern Creek a 3-1 lead in the third with a two-run homer."

²"FERN CREEK, SHELBY WIN. Tony Murphy and Bob Dorwart came through in the clutch yesterday to pace Fern Creek to a 4-2 high school baseball victory over host Southern and the district championship.

Murphy, the starting pitcher, slammed a two-run homer in the third inning to give Fern Creek a 3-1 lead. Randall Lewis, who had singled, was on base when Murphy connected.

Dorwart, a star on Fern Creek's district titlists last spring, struck out the side in the last inning after Southern put men on second and third bases with no outs. ON TO REGIONAL. The victory, Fern Creek's 11th in 16 games, advances Bill Houchin's Tigers to the regional tourney May 28-29 at the University of Louisville."

³"CREEKERS NIP SOUTHERN 4-2 FOR DISTRICT TITLE - Murphy, Dorwart Shine - The Fern Creek Tigers won the district baseball title last week by beating Southern 4-2 in the finals.

Bob Dorwart was the winning pitcher for Fern Creek coming on for Tony Murphy in the fourth inning to win his seventh game of the year. The Tigers led 3-2 when Dorwart took over, and he blanked the Trojans over the last four frames.

Murphy's home run was the big blow for the Tigers, who were out hit nine to three by the Trojans. Southern pounded our four extra base hits (two doubles, and two triples) but left too many runners on base.

Southern had the tying runs on second and third in the last inning when Dorwart struck out the side. Bob Schmidt was the losing pitcher, giving him a 4-2 record for the season.

The game was almost a rerun of last year's district final. Fern Creek defeated Southern in that one with Dorwart on the mound.

Fern Creek reached the finals by downing Thomas Jefferson 8-4 with Dorwart receiving credit for the victory. Dorwart hurled five scoreless innings, but was touched for four runs in the sixth.

The Patriots led 4-1 after six innings, but Fern Creek exploded for seven runs in the top of the seventh. Murphy then come on to pitch for the Tigers in the seventh to protect Dorwart's win."









In Fern Creek's semifinal, Creeker Coach Bill Houchin reported he'll start junior Tony Murphy. "I think Murphy's ready," said Houchin, "but if he gets into trouble I won't hesitate to use Dorwart."

TIGHT AT START – The 6 foot 3, 195 pound senior issued three of his four bases on balls in the first inning. However, the big right hander also came up with three of his 16 strikeouts to erase Handcock County's only scoring threat. "I was a little tight that first inning," said Dorwart after the game. "I was throwing hard but was being too careful. I didn't become relaxed until the third inning. When I found out they couldn't hit my fast ball, I just started throwing the ball over the plate."

Dorwart was never in trouble against Hancock County after that first inning as he improved his won-loss record to 10-4. Sharing honors with the Harvard-bound Dorwart was his battery mate, catcher Randall Lewis. He drove in both Tiger runs.



¹"BOWLING GREEN WINS TITLE ON MARKHAM'S NO-HITTER — Bowling Green's Purples won the State High School Baseball Tournament in a story-book finish here yesterday as left-hander Stan Markham defeated Fern Creek 2-0 on a no-hitter.

Markham, who also pitched Bowling Green's victories over Middlesboro in the first round Wednesday and Ashland in the semifinals yesterday morning, was at his best in the championship game at the University of Kentucky Sportscenter.

Only two Fern Creek players reached base off Markham as the six-foot, 165-pound senior retired the last 19 batters he faced.

In the first inning, Fern Creek's Milton Hughes reached first on an error by shortstop Vanous Lloyd. Fern Creek's next batter, Randall Lewis, forced Hughes at second on a fielder's choice.

From then on, Markham seemed unbeatable as he bested Fern Creek's Bob Dorwart in a brilliant duel and gave Bowling Green its 13^{th} straight win and 23^{rd} in 24 games this season.

Bowling Green – coached by Jim Pickens – scored two runs in the fourth inning when Dave Freeman led off with a solid single to left field. Dorwart retired the next two batters on strikeouts, before hitting Phil Allen and walking Jerry Jones.

With the bases loaded, Greg Guy hit a grounder between first and second base. Fern Creek second baseman Paul Newton stopped the ball on the edge of the outfield grass, but first baseman Hughes, who also tried to field the ball, was unable to cover first base.

Dorwart finally went over to first, but it was too late. Freeman and Allen had already scored and Fern Creek had to settle for second place in this, its first try at the state baseball championship.

Markham, who pitched all three games in the 1964 State Tournament when Bowling Green finished second to Owensboro, struck out nine and walked none.

His three-game tourney statistics for 21 innings were: 12 hits, five runs, four earned runs, seven walks, and 28 strikeouts.

It was only the second time in the State Tournament's 25-year history that a no-hitter was pitched in the final. Manual's Benny Evans did it in a 6-0 victory over Bellvue in 1947.

Fern Creek's loss, its eighth in 23 (sic) [24] games, was a tough one for Dorwart, who Wednesday became the ninth pitcher to hurl a State Tournament no-hitter when he beat Hancock County 2-0.

The big senior right-hander, who saved Fern Creek's 4-3 semifinal win over Ft. Thomas Highlands by pitching five scoreless innings in relief, had only 20 minutes of rest before facing Bowling Green.

Yet, he gave up only two hits, struck out seven and walked three. For 18 straight tournament innings, Dorwart allowed four hits, two runs — both earned — nine walks and 30 strikeouts. He didn't allow a hit for his first 11 2/3 innings."

²" Bowling Green Wins - MARKHAM FINISHES JOB HE STARTED YEAR AGO - Fern Creek is Victim of No-Hitter — What a difference a year makes.

Bowling Green's Stan Markham pitched his team to the Kentucky High School Baseball championship yesterday with a brilliant 2-0 no-hitter over Fern Creek.

Markham was pitching the game on only a few hours' rest. He was the only pitcher Bowling Green used in the three-game tournament. His earlier victories were over Middlesboro 3-1 in the first round and Ashland 5-4 in the semi-finals.

Last year he also pitched three games for Bowling Green in the State tourney, beating Newport Catholic and Madison Central in the first two rounds. He tired, however, when the championship game with Owensboro went into extra innings and lost by two runs.

Markham finished the season with a 13-0 mark and a 42-3 career record.

Loser Bob Dorwart, who pitched a no-hitter Wednesday for Fern Creek, allowed only two hits but two key stolen bases, a costly error and some wildness contributed to the fatal fourth inning.

Dave Freeman opened the frame with a single to left field. Vanous Lloyd fanned, but Freeman stole second and third in the meantime. Phil Allen was hit by a pitch and Dorwart walked Jerry Jones to load the bases.

Greg Guy, hero of Bowling Green's semifinal victory over Ashland, then hit a looper to right that fell safely and scored both his teams runs.

Bowling Green edged the Tomcats earlier in the day when Guy scored from first on a wild pickoff attempt by Billy Lynch. Fern Creek edged Fort Thomas Highlands 4-3 in the other semifinal match."

³"FC BASEBALL TIGERS COLLECT ANOTHER TROPHY - Marathon Meet is Criticized - Bowling Green High captured the Kentucky High School Baseball championship at Lexington behind the iron man pitching performance of Stan Markham.

Markham threw a no-hitter in the finals to help his team beat Fern Creek and Bob Dorwart 2-0. Dorwart had hurled a no-hitter of his own in the opening round, and allowed but 2 in the final game.

Dorwart's no-hitter against Hancock County in which he struck out 16 batters was the outstanding pitching effort of the tournament. Dorwart also pitched five scoreless innings in relief to gain credit for Fern Creek's 4-3 win over Highlands in the second round.

Going into the final game, Dorwart had compiled a phenomenal record during the regional and state tourneys. During this period he registered four victories without a loss, including two no-hitters.

Dorwart pitched a total of 33 innings without giving up a run before Bowling Green scored it two winning runs in the fourth inning of the final game.

Markham's record for the entire tournament was not so impressive. He was touched for 12 hits and five runs in Bowling Green's first two wins – 5-4 over Ashland and 3-1 over Middlesboro.

In all fairness to Markham, however, it should be pointed out that he pitched every inning in all three of Bowling Green's victories during the two-day meet. The young lefthander seemed to coast as much as possible in the first two games, bearing down only when he had to.

Regardless of which team you might have been rooting for, it seemed only fitting for Markham to end his high school career in this fashion. He would up the season with a brilliant 13-0 record, and had a 42-3 record during his high school career. He lost only one regular season game in four years of high school with the other two losses coming in the state purnaments during the last two years.

In fairness to boys such as Markham and Dorwart, it seems that a suitable schedule could be arranged instead of trying to cram an entire state tournament into a two-day period.

Asking any high school boy to pitch two complete games in a single day, or three games in two days seems very unreasonable. The price paid for this kind of victory when weighed against the possibility of a serious arm injury is much too high.

Dorwart started the final game with only 20 minutes rest after his five inning relief stint against Highlands, while Markham had a few hours rest after pitching a complete game against Ashland. (Ashland's 5-4 loss to Bowling Green was their first of the season, snapping a 19 game winning streak).

Markham was involved in the same type situation last year as he pitched all three of his team's state tournament games. He beat Newport Catholic and Madison Central in the first

two games, but when the championship game with Owensboro went into extra innings, he tired and lost by two runs.

To our way of thinking, playing under these circumstances does not decide who has the best team. If the tournament has to be played over a short period such as this, some sort of a limit should be put on the number of innings an individual can pitch.

Markham and Dorwart were selected as the pitchers on the all-tournament team, which came as a surprise to no one. Dorwart's battery mate, Randall Lewis was chosen the catcher, climaxing a fine season.

Lewis and Tony Murphy paced the Tiger hitters just as they had all season with 3 hits each in the three tournament games."

¹"LONGER BASEBALL MEET EYED — The State High School Baseball Tournament may be extended to a three or four-day meet next year, The Courier-Journal has learned.

Such a move will be considered by the Kentucky High School Athletic Association's Board of control at its July meeting.

Also, the board will consider starting the four-day State Basketball Tournament on a Wednesday afternoon instead of Wednesday night. That would cut the long Thursday session of six games to four.

Extending the baseball meeting, now a two-day affair, received support from Bowling Green pitcher Stan Markham and Fern Creek coach Bill Houchin following yesterday's championship game.

"Things turned our okay for me," said Markham, after pitching Bowling Green to the title. "But a three-day meet would be better and would take a lot of pressure off the pitchers' arms."

"The tourney should be four days," said Houchin. "It's ridiculous to play three games in 24 hours. You can ruin a kid's arm,"

Markham pitched 21 innings and Fern Creek pitcher Bob Dorwart pithed 18. "I didn't get tired," said Markham, "but I did worry about my arm. I threw a lot of change-ups early against Fern Creek to save my arm for the last innings."

Both Bowling Green coach Jim Pickens and Houchin are leaving the high school coaching ranks. Pickens will become Western State College's baseball coach. Houchin will remain as a teacher at Fern Creek.

"Since this is my last year," said Houchin, "I wanted to win this tournament badly. But that afternoon game with Highlands took everything out of us."

Markham said he has "about 10 college offers, but no contacts from professional scouts." Naturally, Western is one of the colleges after him.

"Markham never seemed to get tired," said Houchin after the final, which Fern Creek lost 2-0.
"Markham throws with the least bit (of) effort and deserves all the praise you can give him,"

Markham's no-hitter against Fern Creek was the second of his prep career. His first came two years ago against Auburn. His final high school record for four years is 42-3."

2"IT'S QUITE OBVIOUS CHANGES NEEDED IN BASEBALL MEET

Fern Creek High School made its first trip to the State Baseball Tournament a rewarding one, coming home with the runners-up trophy...among other laurels garnered at last week's whirlwind playoff in Lexington.

The endurance test, and that's about what it can best be called, was won by Bowling Green, which defeated a bone-weary band of Tigers – in the finals Thursday afternoon. The finalists were asked to play three games in two days, with Coach Houchin's nine returning to action within 20 minutes after disposing of Highlands of Ft. Thomas in the semi-finals earlier that

afternoon. Bowling green had a morning game, giving its ace hurler Stan Markham another two hours to rest his pitching arm.

Both Fern Creek and Bowling Green, as is the case with most high schools, relied on a one-man pitching staff. To ask a youngster to work seven innings a game in a three-game, two-day tournament is asking too much. At the high school level, heart plays as much of a role as talent. Regardless of the desire to win a young man can be driven just so far. And, without exception, a pitcher's worth can only be measured in his effectiveness on the mound.

Larry Wooden, in his sports round-up on Page 2, puts it this way: "To our way of thinking, playing under these circumstances does not decide who has the best team. If the tournament has to be played over a short period such as this some sort of limit should be put on the number of innings an individual can pitch."

Wooden feels a longer-than-two-day meet would be the best solution. This probably will fall on deaf (official) ears because of the expense involved. Schoolboy baseball isn't exactly a paying proposition. But, we dare say that the Fern Creek Boosters club, and others at schools with regional champions, would gladly help defray the cost of another day or so away from home.

It might be argued that the State Basketball Tournament is another example of "survival of the fittest." True, and well it might be re-organized to eliminate two games on the final day, but, basketball is a game played by five men each of whom runs up and down the floor the same given number of times. Too, as a player tires, he can be removed with later re-entry possible. Not so in baseball: once you leave the action you cannot return.

Nevertheless, Fern Creek fared well. Coach Houchin did a commendable job with his young charges who represented Louisville and Jefferson County schools in the finest of manner.
